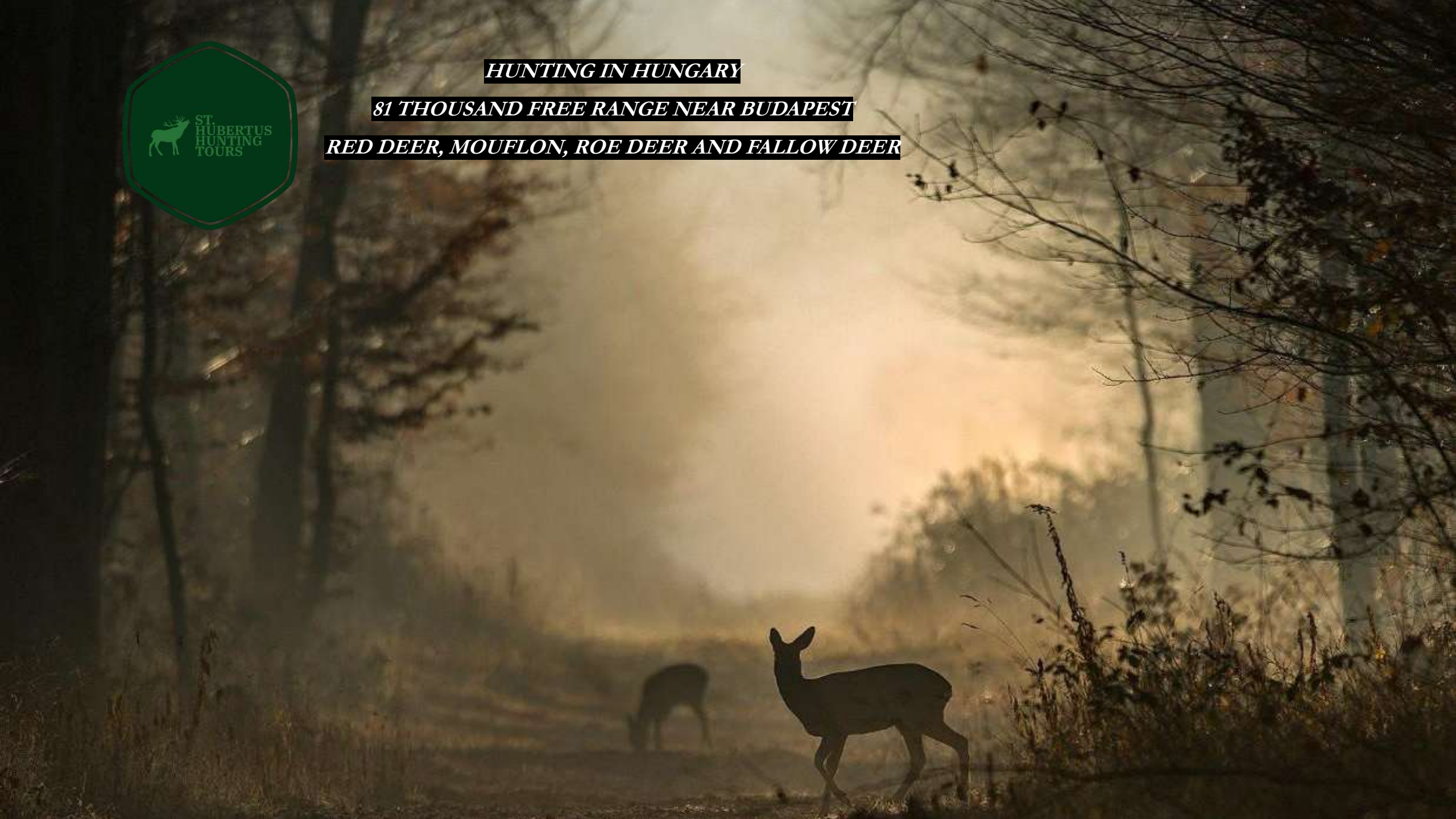




HUNTING IN HUNGARY

81 THOUSAND FREE RANGE NEAR BUDAPEST

RED DEER, MOUFLON, ROE DEER AND FALLOW DEER



THE HUNTING DISTRICT AND GAME MANAGEMENT

The forestry and hunting company offers high-quality hunting opportunities in an area of approximately 81,000 hectares. The remarkable historical hunting grounds, which feature monuments and diverse geographical features, are located less than 50 km from Budapest. In addition to game species such as red deer, fallow deer, roe deer, mouflon and wild boar, numerous small predators and other animal species such as wild cats, golden jackals, foxes and badgers live there. Wildlife is an integral part of the ecosystem, so it is important that wildlife and forest management are closely coordinated and ecologically sound. While herbivorous wildlife impacts its environment, it can also cause significant damage to forest stands by eating tree buds and fruit, and stripping bark in winter. To compensate for the missing regulatory elements of the ecosystem (large predators), maintain natural processes and achieve continuous forest cover, it is essential to regulate wildlife numbers in accordance with the forest's tolerance levels. A forest ecosystem that functions better and is healthier adapts more easily to a changing climate. The relationship between the forest and its inhabitants, and the interactions between them, are managed and shaped by ecological wildlife management, which has become indispensable in modern society. The aim is to create species-rich, naturally regenerating forests suitable for the local area by regulating wild animal density, thereby improving the natural food supply and ensuring biodiversity is preserved and protected. Ecological wildlife management seeks to return wildlife populations to near-natural conditions in which their winter food requirements correspond to the tolerance of the habitat, eliminating the need for special feeding. As well as ensuring continuous forest cover and preserving the natural state of forests, controlling the population of big game through hunting provides a healthy, sustainable food source. Game from these forests is a natural, mineral-rich raw material of high quality with physiological effects and enjoyment value.



FIRST HUNTING AREA

The first hunting area covers around 32,000 hectares. It is mainly covered by dense oak, hornbeam and beech forests. The territory is characterised by a mountainous landscape with altitudes ranging from 300 to approximately 800 metres above sea level. Due to its rugged terrain, the area is deeply carved by gorges and valleys, making some parts difficult to access. This is a challenging hunting ground that requires good physical fitness. Red deer, mouflon, roe deer and wild boar can be found in these free range, with red deer and mouflon offering good trophy potential. Red stag trophies weigh an average of 6–7 kg, but the most prized trophies can exceed 10 kg. The largest mouflon trophies measure approximately 75–85 cm.

























SECOND HUNTING AREA

The second hunting area covers 17,000 hectares and borders directly on the outskirts of Budapest. It is mainly covered by sessile oak and hornbeam forests, with a small percentage of beech. In the weaker areas, there are black and Scots pine woods that provide protection. This hilly area is less rugged than the first area, with more pastures, although wooded areas remain predominant. There is also a fenced area of around 900 hectares containing a population of red deer, fallow deer and mouflon. In free range, fallow deer trophies do not exceed 3.5 kg and mouflon trophies do not exceed 80 cm. In the fenced area mouflon trophies exceed 90 cm and fallow deer trophies exceed 4 kg. Red deer and roe deer trophies are of average quality, weighing around 300 grams and 6–7 kg respectively. The area boasts some record-breaking wild boar trophies.

















THE OTHER THREE HUNTING AREAS

Of the other hunting areas, the third is located on a wooded, hilly landscape and covers 19,000 hectares, with an average altitude of 250 metres above sea level. It is covered with forests of holm oak, oak, acacia, black pine and Scots pine, as well as a small percentage of hornbeam and oak. This area is home to high-quality red deer and mouflon populations, while the fallow deer and roe deer populations are of medium trophy quality. Red deer trophies weigh an average of 6–7 kg, but stags weighing more than 10 kg are also shot every year. Mouflon trophies measure approximately 80–90 cm. The fourth hunting zone covers 7,000 hectares of hilly, wooded landscape dominated by mixed forests, with smaller percentages of hornbeam, sessile oak, and beech trees. This area was once home to the Sándor-Metternich family's fascinating hunting estates. The hunting area includes a 500-hectare fenced enclosure with red deer and mouflon, as well as a 300-hectare enclosure built in 1800 which is home to fallow deer and mouflon. All species of game can be found in free range. The mouflon population has exceptional genetic characteristics, while the red deer and fallow deer populations are of good quality. Several rams with trophies up to 85 cm and stags with trophies normally up to 8 kg have also been shot in free range, with some specimens exceeding 9 kg. In the enclosed areas, mouflon trophies often exceed 90 cm, with some exceeding 100 cm; fallow buck trophies exceed 4 kg; and red deer trophies exceed 10 kg. The roe deer population is of minor importance from a game management perspective, and the quality of the trophies is average. The fifth hunting zone covers 6,000 hectares and is located in a hilly, wooded landscape. It is mainly covered by holm oak forests, while hornbeam and oak forests cover the best parts. Acacia forests also cover a significant percentage of the area. There are two fenced areas within the hunting zone, offering the opportunity to hunt mouflon across 700 and 450 hectares, respectively. The free range are home to an excellent population of red deer, with an average trophy weight of 6–7 kg, with the finest trophies exceeding 10 kg. Roe bucks are of average quality for the region. Despite the relatively low weight of the trophies, the red deer population in free range is characterized by a high percentage of medal-winning trophies thanks to their favourable length and circumference. The mouflon population in the hunting reserve is of good quality, with trophies reaching or exceeding 90 cm.





















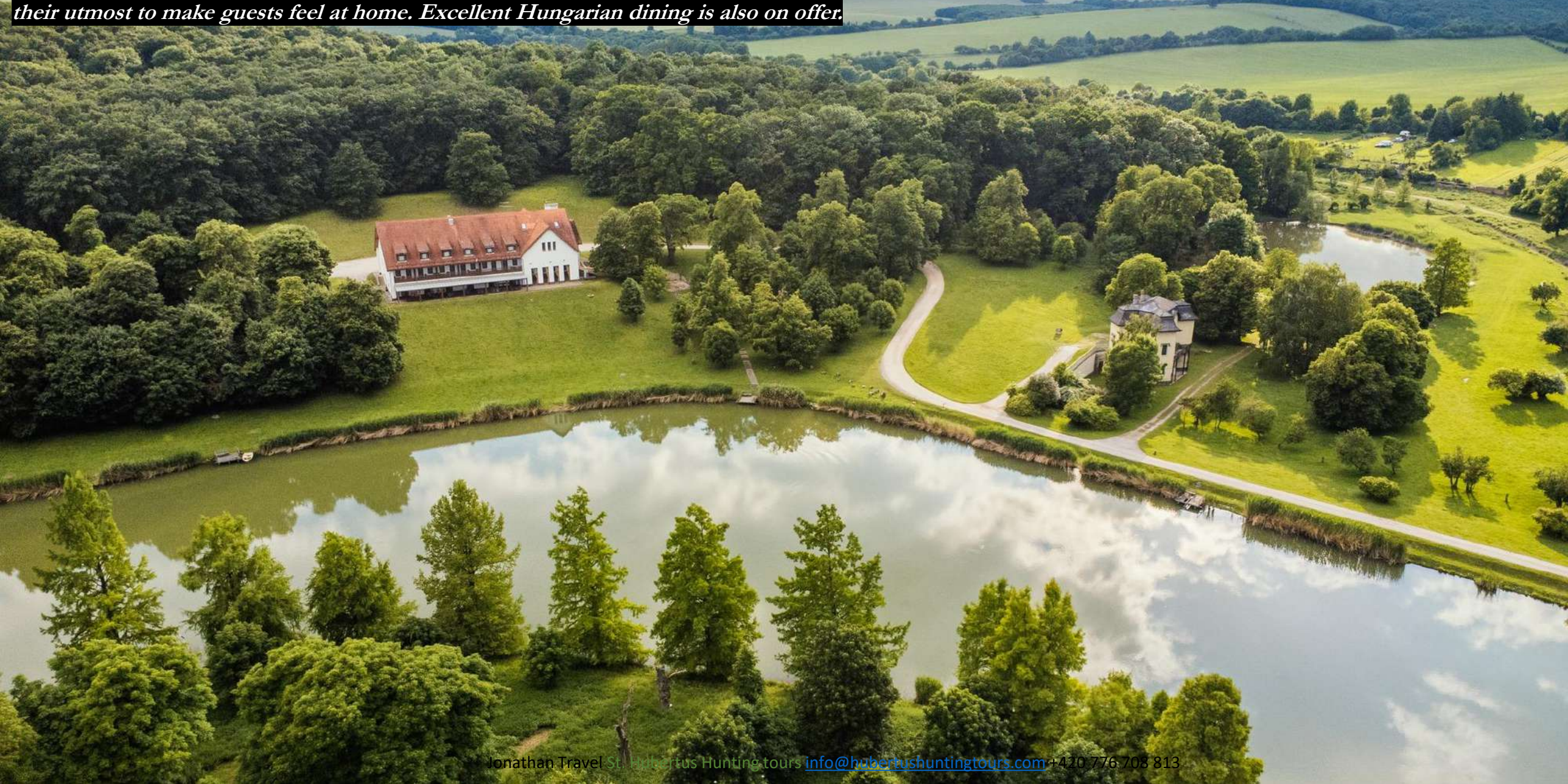






HUNTING LODGES
